


# Sustainability Demystified!



**How can a business leader get started with sustainability?** Phases: Sustainability is a journey e.g. 1<sup>st</sup> sustainability awareness, 2<sup>nd</sup> sustainability understanding, 3<sup>rd</sup> sustainability application, 4<sup>th</sup> sustainability performance and progress, and 5<sup>th</sup> sustainability impact and change; Start with a sustainability assessment or eco-audit e.g. where is the organization today?; impact of sustainable supply chain management e.g. 1<sup>st</sup> compliance, 2<sup>nd</sup> continuous improvement, 3<sup>rd</sup> integration; 4<sup>th</sup> innovation, 5<sup>th</sup> leadership

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
