National World Soil Day 2021 at UCSI Schools

12 Jan 2022, Port Dickson, Negeri Sembilan: UCSI Springhill Schools and Teens4CAP recently coorganised the Teens4CAP National World Soil Day Competition during World Soil Day that was held on 5th December 2021.

The competition's theme, "Halt Soil Salinization, Boost Soil Productivity", attracted 250 participants between the age of 13 to 19 from various schools and alternative education centres to raise awareness on the importance of preserving soil health to protect the environment and create regenerative agriculture.

The competition also provides an opportunity for students to showcase their creativity in soil painting or video making while advocating for environmental sustainability.
